## WHAT IS ADVENT?

It's the most wonderful time of year, isn't it? And while some scoff at carols being sung on the radio before December 1, Christians throughout history have embraced this season of spiritual preparation using Advent readings—short Bible passages read during the lighting of the <u>Advent wreath</u>. This sacred time invites us to slow down from all the holiday preparations and parties, take a deep breath, and remember the reason for the season: the eternal Jesus Christ taking on human flesh. But how do all the different parts of <u>Advent</u> work together, and how can you incorporate Advent into your life?

#### What Are the Four Sundays of Advent?

If you've ever struggled to keep the four Sundays of Advent straight, you're not alone. For hundreds of years, faithful Christians have observed the four weeks leading up to Christmas Day as a special time to prepare their hearts, but these practices have changed over time and place.

The first mention of Advent is found in ancient writings dating back to the sixth century, with some anecdotal mentions as early as AD 380 at the Spanish Council of Saragossa! So not only is it an old Christian practice, but it's also a very personal one, as churches have adapted the practice to suit their local churches.

So, while there's no authoritative guide to Advent, we can find some commonalities in the ways churches have practiced the observance of Advent throughout history.

Generally, the themes that correspond to each week fall into these categories:

Week 1: Hope (or promise)

Week 2: Preparation (or waiting or prophecy)

Week 3: Joy (or peace)

Week 4: Love (or adoration)



While the differences in weekly Advent themes may be confusing, we can unite in our desire to quiet our hearts during a hectic holiday season and worship Jesus. And the good news is that you can definitely mix and match these weekly themes with various Advent readings that will best serve your family. There is no right or wrong way to observe Advent as long as you're coming to God with a sincere and open heart.

#### Advent Wreath Candle Lighting Readings for 2021

Twinkling lights and candles everywhere remind us that Jesus is the light of the world that came to dispel the darkness. That theme of light is what originally gave birth to the Advent wreath hundreds of years ago in Lutheran Germany, and it's become a beloved tradition in many churches and homes. The Advent Wreath is typically an evergreen wreath containing five candles, each lit on successive Sundays during the Advent readings. Some variations of the Advent wreath include different colors to correspond to different themes, while others keep the candles a simple white.

As it's practiced in church services, the Advent wreath is usually lit at the beginning of the weekly service with its accompanying Advent reading from the Bible. However, many families choose to create an Advent wreath and set it on the dinner table, lighting the candles and using that family time to remind themselves and their children that the Christmas season is first and foremost about Jesus. Other families set the Advent wreath on their mantel. Again, the beauty of this tradition is that you can make it your own, as it suits you and your family. (Article not original)



Operation Christmas Child National Collection week for 2021 is over. Pilot Knob participated again and we sent 183 shoeboxes. This proved to be a challenging year for some but our church benefited from a team member's damp basement to fulfill our Connect Conference theme—Nehemiah 4:19-20 "The work is great and widely spread, and we are separated on the wall, far from one another. In the place where you hear the sound of the trumpet, rally to us there. Our God will fight for us." Many of the NE Iowa team members made several trips to help pack boxes in St. Ansgar and she gave many of our members boxes of items to take to our churches to use in our own shoeboxes. She had already paid for shipping, as she donates year round. I was privileged to meet two individuals, including Vickie R. who pack over 1000 boxes personally, WOW!

As part of the Samaritan's Purse update Prayer Point, it tells of a small congregation of 25 members who started packing 20 shoeboxes for a few years. After a decade they felt the Lord leading them to ask a different question. Instead of asking "What can we afford?" they asked "God what do you want us to do?" In 2014 they set a goal of 500 boxes, yet the Lord provided 532 boxes. In 2015 they sent 2,000 boxes, and even though Hurricane Harvey flooded the homes of seven church members, the congregation packed 8,000 boxes. In 2019 the congregation of 51 members packed 11,139 shoeboxes. Is it time to ask God what he wants from us?

Bill Keel found a trailer for us to use this year and he volunteered to drive it to Waterloo. We were just south of Mason City on the Avenue of the Saints when a trailer tire shredded. Thankfully no one was hurt and he was prepared with a jack and the correct tools to get the tire off. We drove to Mason and he purchased a new tire and had it mounted. We only used an hour of time, but the fender will have to be replaced.

May God bless those who gave of their time, talent, monetary gifts and prayers. God will bless those who receive these gospel opportunities and multiply His followers.

By the numbers:

In 2016 we collected 32 shoeboxes, 406 total and shipped 27 cartons.

In 2017 we collected 37 shoeboxes, 419 total and shipped 27 cartons.

In 2018 we collected 62 shoeboxes, 346 total and shipped 23 cartons.

In 2019 we collected 84 shoeboxes, 429 total and shipped 29 cartons.

In 2020 we collected 72 shoeboxes, 308 total and shipped 23 cartons.

In 2021 we collected 183 shoeboxes, 464 total and shipped 33 cartons.

#### Suffering, Sacrifice...and Love

We all know that there will be no suffering in heaven, right? Have you ever really thought about that contrast between heaven and earth- I mean beyond maybe wishing for that reality of freedom from suffering now? What does it mean for us while we are still here on earth in the midst of plenty of suffering every single day?

Think about this: while there may no longer be suffering once we enter into eternity, we will still be praising God continually, but the difference is that it will no longer be a *sacrifice* for us. Simply a joy and a pleasure. With the absence of pain and suffering, there's no need to lift our eyes from those distractions anymore. No longer will we be in an environment where we have to struggle against temptations, distractions, and evil in the world. So while we may be eager to bypass the struggles of the here and now on earth, and get to the "good" stuff where there is only joy, peace and love...it's only here on earth that we have the *option* of offering a real *sacrifice* to God that personally costs us something. Praise that *we choose* to offer at the depths of despair, obedience to God's voice that *we choose* to follow over our own personal desires, eyes of love that *we choose* to use in seeing other people instead of our own eyes of prejudice and judgment. Those are all sacrifices that we offer up to God when we choose His ways over our own. When our life on this earth is done, there will no longer be an opportunity to offer a true *sacrifice* of glorifying God *in the midst* of suffering.

We're always being tested as to what's really in our own hearts. How much are we really living for God, and how much is simply for ourselves? How ready are we to praise and trust in His goodness even when we feel He hasn't been "good" to us? It's a *sacrifice* to offer praise at the bottom of the pit. A pleasing aroma that ascends to the throne in a way that praise offered from a mountaintop doesn't. Don't get me wrong, all praise offered to God is pleasing to Him, yet one is more *sacrificial* than the other. It costs *us* more to give it. David's heart in 2Sam 24:24 shows us this: "...nor will I offer burnt offerings to the LORD my God with that which costs me nothing."

Like the woman who used an expensive perfume to anoint Jesus (Matthew 26)...it was very costly to her. It reveals to us just how much Jesus meant to her personally that she would buy something so expensive, just to pour it out. Have you heard the modern day advice of spending three months of your salary on an engagement ring? (Apparently the idea stems from a marketing campaign from the 1930s that sold people the idea that how in love and committed you are was directly related to how much the ring costs.) Now, can you imagine spending your whole year's salary on someone else to show your love for them? Apparently, the cost of the perfume poured out on Jesus by this woman is estimated to be about a years salary. Isn't that a beautiful picture of devotion, sacrifice, and love? To the rest of those in the room it looked wasteful and foolish, but Jesus was deeply moved by her sacrifice. He knew what it cost her- just like He knows the cost of our own personal sacrifices. No one else may know...but God does. He sees the heart in a way that no other human can. Just like this woman, we can offer up our sacrifices of prayer, worship, service and loving others as a similar pleasing aroma to the Lord (even when we don't feel like it- for that makes it a sacrifice). Not for recognition, or an attempt to earn His favor (which He already graciously gave us when we believed in Jesus), but simply as an offering of devotion unto the Lord. Just out of love. Because He is worthy. Anything offered out of pure love is indeed a pleasing aroma to God.

## **Prayer Reminder:**

The Supreme Court is scheduled to hear oral arguments Dec. 1 in the case of Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization, which is about a Mississippi abortion law that bars abortions after 15 weeks. That case is on the substance of the law and could potentially result in the overturning of Roe v. Wade.
