What comes to mind when you think of October 31? If you're like most people you would say Halloween. Halloween, from it's beginning in the second century B.C. up to today, has been a day for occult sacrifices.

However, as the educated Lutherans we are, October 31 has another meaning. On that day in 1517, a monk and professor named Martin Luther published his 95 Theses against the Catholic Church Doctrine asserting that a person could earn or buy forgiveness through the practice of indulgences (good works, reciting prayers or monetary donations). Luther stated clearly that salvation comes only by grace through faith in Jesus Christ. His 95 theses nailed to the castle Church door in Wittenberg called for a debate with Catholic leaders and marked the beginning of the protestant reformation. Here are the words from the introductory paragraph: "Out of love for the truth and the desire to bring it to light, the following propositions will be discussed at Wittenberg, under the presidency of the Reverend Father Martin Luther, Master of Arts and of Sacred Theology, and Lecturer in Ordinary on the same at that place. Wherefore he requests that those who are unable to be present and debate orally may do so by letter. In the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen." He then listed his 95 propositions that were to be debated.


After more than 1000 years of spiritual darkness, the gospel was rediscovered and the people began to experience, through the power of the Holy Spirit, the comforting reality of Christ's salvation. Roman Catholic doctrines were challenged because they were not seen as teachings of Jesus Christ. Finally, the purity of the gospel was being taught and preached in the people's native language and once again, souls were genuinely saved and lives changed. This reformation did not happen overnight and it was not without great cost. Over the years many Christians proclaimed biblical truth at the cost of imprisonment, torture and being burned alive. It was indeed the blood of martyrs that paved the way for the church we know today.

One of the five pillars of the reformation is *sola scriptura*: scripture alone. For hundreds of year people were taught that Church Tradition (Rome) had the same authority and was even superior to that of the Bible. Since the Bible was printed in Hebrew, Greek and Latin the common person could not read it for himself and thus test what was being taught. Sola Scriptura meant that only the OT and NT were God-breathed and therefore the sole and sufficient authority in all matters of faith and practice. (2 Timothy 3:16-17)

Therefore, tradition that does not pass the test of scripture is to be rejected. Mt. 15:2-3 Why do your disciples break the tradition of the elders? They don't wash their hands before they eat! Jesus replied, and why do you break the command of God for the sake of your tradition? Time and again the reformers rejected the teachings of the "Holy Mother Church", the decisions of Popes and the decrees of councils because they were contrary to scripture. They know and understand that man's word and traditions were temporary and God's word eternal. Psalm 119:160 All your words are true; all your righteous laws are eternal, Matthew 24:35 Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will never pass away. What happens when religion and worship is built on human tradition? It will crumble and not save a soul, but provide a false sense of eternal security. Matthew 15:8-9 These people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me. They worship me in vain; their teachings are merely human rules.

Sola Scriptura is the sole, sufficient and final authority in all matters of faith and life. Only God's word can reach the lost or confused. *1 Peter 1:23 For you have been born again, not of perishable seed, but of imperishable, through the living and enduring word of God.* I believe it is time to get God's word in our hearts that we will know the truth of scripture and the Living Truth, Jesus Christ. Only then will we be able to make sense of world events.

Pastor appreciation month is a special time that congregations set aside each year to honor their pastor for his sacrificial dedication and multiple blessings. It is typically scheduled for the month of October with the second Sunday (Oct. 9, 2022) designated as Pastor Appreciation Sunday


